Second Announcement and Call for Abstracts

EAPCCT 2012

The EAPCCT XXXII International Congress will be held in **London**, vibrant capital of the United Kingdom, the venue for the 2012 Olympics and one of the great historical cities of the world. The congress will take place in the expansive and modern facilities at the Lancaster London Hotel, situated on the north side of Hyde Park. This is within easy reach of the many London attractions and is a short walk from Oxford Street, where London's most famous shops are located. Public transport links to this part of London are excellent, and all the major tourist and night-time attractions of the city are within easy travelling distance.

As in previous years, the Congress is organised both academically and administratively by the EAPCCT Scientific and Meetings Committee. This will ensure that delegates gain the maximum benefit from the Congress. The Congress will once again be co-sponsored by the American Academy of Clinical Toxicology, which will also accredit the Congress for continuing medical education. Abstracts from this meeting will be published in an issue of the journal *Clinical Toxicology*, the official Journal of the American Academy of Clinical Toxicology, the European Association of Poisons Centres and Clinical Toxicologists and the American Association of Poison Control Centers in time for the Congress.

The Pre-Congress will focus on "*Emergency Department Management and Assessment of the Poisoned Patient*", including case presentations using last years' popular interactive voting system.

The principal themes of the academic programme of the Congress are: Exposure biomarkers for the assessment of toxic risks; Pulmonary toxicants; Drugs and doping agents: Medico-legal issues for toxicologists; Mechanisms of toxicity – Relevance to features and management of poisoning; CBRN disasters; Poison centre developments for the future; Envenomation.

There will also be a poster discussion session featuring a selection of interesting and controversial topics. New for this year will be four Pro/Con-debates on controversial toxicological subjects.

At the XXXII International Congress in London we hope to offer you an outstanding academic programme, balanced with the usual social events in a spectacular and historic city. Your participation will guarantee the quality of our programme and in return you will be stimulated by four days of the finest continuing education in clinical toxicology. We look forward to seeing you in London, and hope that you will take the opportunity to visit this part of the UK, and sample its many delights in the days either side of the meeting.

CONTINUING EDUCATION IN CLINICAL TOXICOLOGY

Tuesday 29 May 2012

In order to provide Continuing Education in Clinical Toxicology (CECT), the EAPCCT Scientific and Meetings Committee has arranged a TOXUPDATE. This one-day symposium will include state-of-the-art presentations on:

- Emergency Department Management and Assessment of the Poisoned Patient – to include both talks and case studies and also interactive sessions with a voting system.

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAMME

Wednesday 30 May - Friday 1 June 2012

The themes for the Congress are shown below and abstracts on these topics would be particularly welcomed:

- Exposure biomarkers for the assessment of toxic risks
- Pulmonary toxicants
- Drugs and doping agents: Medico-legal issues for toxicologists
- Mechanisms of toxicity - Relevance to features and management of poisoning
- CBRN disasters
- Poison centre developments for the future
- Envenomation

Pro/Con debates

There will be up to four debates on hot topics on important concerns challenged by two specialists followed by questions from the audience with an electronic vote before and after the debate.

Plenary lectures

There will be up to three plenary lectures with invited speakers who are acknowledged experts in their fields.

Poster discussion session

As in Dubrovnik, there will be a poster discussion session as part of the programme where posters of special interest or controversy are discussed.

Young Investigator's Award

A Young Investigator's Award will again be presented this year. A shortlist will be chosen by the Scientific Committee on the basis of the quality of the abstracts submitted. The winner will

receive an honorarium of Euro 1000. To be considered for the award the person applying must fulfil the following criteria:

- Young investigators are defined as <40 years of age on the last day of the Congress (Friday 1 June 2012). This will be confirmed prior to the prize being awarded by passport check.
- The young investigator must be the principle investigator of the research being presented. This means that they have taken the lead in performing the research and are the most appropriate person to present the research at the Congress. It is acceptable for the young investigator to have research collaborators over the age of 40 and these can be listed on the abstract. This might include a research supervisor.
- The research submitted must be original and must not have been published or presented at another conference.
- Applicants do not need to be members of the EAPCCT but they must be present at the Congress to present the research.
- Previous winners are not eligible.

Judging the winner

Those on the final shortlist will be invited to make an oral presentation of their work at the Young Investigator session at the Congress. Oral presentations for the award will take place in one session. The quality of presentations will be judged by at least 3 senior judges who are invited to do this by the Scientific Committee. These judges will not have relevant conflicts of interest. The judges will score each presentation and at the end of the session will come to a consensus on which presentation should receive the award. The decision of the judges is final.

Assistance with abstracts

Alison Good has been appointed as Abstract Editor for this Congress. She will be happy to help with English before abstracts are submitted. She will also suggest changes for those who request English help during the submission process. However, if abstracts are submitted at the very end of the submission process there is no guarantee that the English corrections can be agreed with the author before the review process starts. Please contact sc@eapcct.org for further information.

Members of the Board and Scientific Committee are ready to help scientists who are not used to presenting data and structuring an abstract. If you think that a review of your abstract before final submission might help you, please feel free to send your abstract as soon as possible, to gs@eapcct.org

Please note that this pre-review process is not a guarantee of acceptance of your abstract by the Scientific Committee.

ABSTRACT SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

General notes

- The EAPCCT Scientific and Meetings Committee, chaired by Bruno Mégarbane will evaluate the abstracts. The Scientific and Meetings Committee's decision will be final.
- **Abstracts must be submitted by midnight (CET+1) on Monday 21 November 2011** to be considered by the Scientific Committee. If you request help with English it is important to submit well before the final submission date. If you submit after 13 November there is no guarantee that there will be time to supply help with English before the review process starts.
- All abstracts accepted for presentation at the Congress will be published in the journal Clinical Toxicology. The decision of the Scientific and Meetings Committee in this regard will be final. There is no longer a category of abstracts accepted for the Congress but not published in Clinical Toxicology.
- **No abstract received after 21 November 2011 will be considered for the meeting, unless agreed in advance by the Chairman.**

On-line abstract submission

- ALL abstracts should be submitted electronically via the EAPCCT website <http://www.eapcct.org>. Detailed instructions for this are provided on the website.
- Instructions given below must be adhered to strictly. As time does not permit return of inadequately prepared abstracts for revision, they will be rejected! An exception may be made for minor correctable errors, at the discretion of the Scientific Committee.
- Submission of the electronic form signifies understanding of, and agreement with, all the conditions set out below.

If you have no Internet access or experience technical problems

- If you do not have access to the Internet, or you encounter technical problems that prevent you from submitting on-line please contact the Congress Secretariat who will assist with technical problems, or make arrangements for you to submit via e-mail or mail if necessary.

Abstract format

The instructions give the general guidance for format although the electronic submission tool will format much of your abstract automatically. However, you are strongly advised to pre-prepare

your abstract, using the guidance notes below, **before** attempting to submit your work on-line, since each session on-line is time limited. You will be asked to upload a back-up version of your abstract (preferably prepared in Word), with a separate file if a table is included. **Note: Graphs and other figures are no longer permitted.**

- Authors should be listed using the entire surname and the initial(s). Omit titles, degrees, and academic appointments and do not separate initials with punctuation e.g. Smith MP
- The affiliation must comprise **ONLY** department name, institution, city, state/province and country.
- The body of the abstract should be organised as outlined below. You **must** include the underlined words in the body of your abstract (do not attempt to underlined these in your submission). Please note that our system requires the presence of the colon (:) after these underlined words to recognise them as headings. You must therefore use the colons, e.g. Objective:
- Objective: A statement of the purpose or reason for the report. Methods: A brief description of the study design. Results: A summary of the results presented in sufficient detail to support the conclusion. Data must be presented in the abstract. Statements such as “the results will be presented” or “other data will be presented to support....” will result in automatic rejection of the abstract. Conclusion: a statement of the conclusion based on the data presented. References: All references should appear at the end of the abstract in numerical order as they appear in the text. Ensure references are cited in the text by a number in parentheses e.g. (23). Follow the referencing style below. Generally reference numbers should be limited to 5 or less (10 or less for an invited lecture).
- References for **Journal articles** should be formatted as in the following example: Giannini L, Vannacci A, Missanelli A, et al. Amatoxin poisoning: a 15-year retrospective analysis and follow-up evaluation of 105 patients. Clin Toxicol 2007; 45: 539-42.
- References for **Book chapters** should be formatted as follows: Goadsby PJ. Pathophysiology of headache. In: Silberstein SD, Lipton RB, Dalessio DJ, eds. Wolff's headache and other head pain. 7th ed. Oxford, England: Oxford University Press, 2001:57-72.
- For case reports or case series, the words Case report: or Case series: replace the Methods: and Results: headings. Otherwise, the format remains the same.
- Reports of non-clinical studies, such as those describing poisons centre operations or educational tools should attempt to follow these guidelines as closely as possible.
- The number of words is limited strictly to **350** excluding the title, authors and affiliations or 250 words plus one simple table. Each word or number is counted as one word whether it is one character or 10 characters long. (The previous sentence has a word count of 18). Units will count as part of the number with which they are attached. The sentence “The patient’s salicylate concentration was 1000 mg/L” has a word count of six.
- For plenary lectures, keynotes and presentations for the educational Pre-congress there is no general requirement to submit an abstract. However, a set of 3-5 learning objectives which give a clear summary of the topics to be covered **must** be provided. Speakers may if they wish submit an abstract of up to 1000 words (including up to 10 references or 900 words if including a table) for peer review by the Scientific Committee and publication in Clinical Toxicology alongside the other abstracts. Invited speakers will receive separate notification

of the details.

- Please do NOT use automatic Word functions, e.g. numbering, bullet points or footnotes.
- Use of tables creates editorial difficulties and these are therefore discouraged. However, you may include **one simple** table. If a table is used the word count of the abstract must be cut by 100 (i.e. to 250 words).
- Figures and graphs/diagrams are no longer allowed.
- Please be aware that the on-line submission system removes all special formatting, including bold, italic, underline, superscript, and subscript. Necessary formatting, e.g. H₂O and similar, will be replaced in your abstract (if accepted for the Congress) prior to publication. Please also be aware that on-line submission may also affect the appearance of Greek and other symbols – to avoid confusion please spell them out in full (if possible), e.g. “beta-blocker”, “micrograms”.
- Use only standard abbreviations. As there is no incentive to using smaller words, non-standard and extensive abbreviations will only detract from your abstract’s acceptability. Numbers may be used to replace words, e.g. 5 rather than five, though the word count remains the same.
- An example of abstract style is printed at the end of this section. This represents how abstracts will appear in the Congress book.

Notification of abstract receipt

- The on-line submission tool will allocate your abstract a unique identification number at the start. Please note this for your own records.
- A confirmation message will be displayed at the end of on-line submission. We recommend you **print** a copy of this for your records as well.
- Please note that after successful on-line submission it is NOT necessary to provide documentation by mail or e-mail.
- Submitters will be notified of the acceptance or rejection of their abstract by **Monday 30 January 2012**. Authors who have provided an e-mail address will receive this notification via that e-mail address.
- All abstract presenters will be asked to return a form by e-mail confirming their intention to attend the meeting. Please send this back promptly so that we know you have received our notification of acceptance.
- All abstract presenters must register for the Congress by **Friday 17 February 2012**. Failure to do so will result in the abstract being withdrawn from publication in the journal *Clinical Toxicology*, and will result in administrative rejection of the abstract.

Arrival and travel in London

By air

London is served by 5 airports – Heathrow, Gatwick, Stansted, London City and Luton. For easy access to the Lancaster Hotel Heathrow airport is probably the most convenient and the Heathrow Express trains drop you at a station about 5 minutes walk away. However, all the airports are well served by rail and/or underground services.

All the airports can be reached by taxi as well – but London traffic congestion is famous and taxis are a very expensive means of transport. You are strongly advised to use rail or underground services as detailed below!

Heathrow Airport

The **cheapest** way to get to and from Heathrow is via the underground (Piccadilly line). Journey time is about one hour. You then are able to switch to other underground to reach your final destinations without further fare costs. Oyster cards (see below) are valid.

The **quickest** way into town is to use the Paddington/ Heathrow Express. Journey time is 15 minutes and trains run regularly. You can buy tickets in advance on-line, at the station, or even on the train. www.heathrowexpress.com

Gatwick Airport

Overland trains are the best option for connecting to and from the city. The rail station is at Gatwick's South Terminal.

The **quickest** way to London is the Victoria/Gatwick express. Journey time is 30 minutes. You can buy tickets in advance on-line, at the station, or even on the train. www.gatwickexpress.com

The **cheapest** way into town is to use the normal train services to either Victoria or London Bridge. Journey times are about 40 minutes. You can buy tickets at the station.

Stansted Airport

Overland trains are the best option for connecting to the city. Use the Stansted Express which takes you to Liverpool Street station. Some trains stop at Tottenham Hale station where you can connect directly to the Underground system. Trains take about 45 minutes. You can buy tickets at the station.

London City Airport

This small airport is conveniently situated to the East of the city and has excellent connections. There is a direct connection to the Docklands Light Railway (DLR), essentially part of the London Transport network so you can use Oyster cards (see below).

Luton Airport

There is a free bus link from this rather remote airport to Luton Airport Parkway station from where there are overland trains into the city. Journey time is about 1 hour. You can buy tickets at the station.

By train

Eurostar trains via the channel tunnel from Paris, Lille and Brussels arrive at the refurbished St Pancras Station next to King's Cross from where you can take the Underground.

Car rental

There are several different options at the airports.

Banking services and currency

The UK uses the Pound (Sterling), (1 Pound (£) = 100 pence). All major credit cards are accepted in hotels, shops and restaurants. "CHIP and PIN" systems are very common to validate transactions. Cash can also be withdrawn from most ATMs and they often provide instructions in different languages. Foreign currency can be exchanged in banks, exchange offices, post offices, travel agencies and hotels. Cheques can be cashed in banks, but charges may be levied.

Clothing

In May / June the average high temperature is 21⁰C, though the UK is famous for its variable weather.

Electricity supply

Electricity is 220 V, 50 Hz. Note that power outlets in the UK are the three pin variety – though many of the Lancaster accommodation rooms have European 2-pin sockets as well. Socket adaptors may be required.

Health and water

London presents no health problems to the sensible traveller. The water is safe to drink in all parts of the UK.

Insurance

In registering for the XXXII Congress of the EAPCCT, participants agree that neither the Scientific and Meetings Committee nor the EAPCCT assume any liability whatsoever. Participants are requested to make their own arrangements regarding health and travel insurance. Language

The official language of the conference will be English. Simultaneous translation will not be provided.

Time

Local time will be GMT +1 hours.

Tipping

Taxes are included in the bill for most holiday scenarios. Service charges in restaurants are sometimes included and sometimes not so it is advisable to check. If not then tipping is customary but not obligatory. Between 5-10% is usual for tips dependent on quality of service.
